# Overview

- Our new data tool offers a detailed profile of the 11.4 million unauthorized immigrants in the U.S.
- The tool includes sub-national data:
  - Topline numbers for U.S., 47 states, and D.C.
  - Detailed profiles for U.S., 41 states, and D.C.
  - Topline numbers + detailed profiles coming soon for 95 counties in 22 states





# Methodology

- We used U.S. Census Bureau 2008 Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP) to assign legal status to cases in the 2008-2012 American Community Survey (ACS).
- SIPP asks people if they have LPR status (aka green card); we assigned LPR status to those with similar characteristics (origin country, age, etc.) in the ACS.
- We excluded people with temporary legal status (students, H-1Bs, TPS) from unauthorized population.



# Elements Included in Profiles

- **Demographic characteristics**
  - Top countries/regions of birth
  - Years of U.S. residence
  - Age/gender
  - Marital and parental status
- **Education and language**
  - School enrollment of children and youth
  - Educational attainment of adults
  - English proficiency
  - Top languages spoken
- **Economic characteristics**
  - Employment and top industries
  - Income levels
  - Access to health insurance
  - Home ownership

# Selected Findings: Years of Residency

- New settlement states: highest % unauthorized with < 5 years U.S. residency

Alabama	31%
Massachusetts	30%

# Selected Findings: Years of Residency

- Old settlement states: highest % unauthorized with > 10 years U.S. residency

# Selected Findings: Education

- Most educated: highest % unauthorized with high school degrees or greater

<b>New Jersey</b>	<b>65%</b>

<b>Virginia</b>	<b>64%</b>
<b>Ohio</b>	<b>64%</b>
<b>Florida</b>	<b>62%</b>

# Selected Findings: Education

- Least educated: highest % unauthorized with 8<sup>th</sup> grade education or less

# Selected Findings: Health Insurance

- Highest % unauthorized *with* health insurance coverage

United States	37%
Hawaii	80%
Massachusetts	75%
District of Columbia	74%
Michigan	51%
Minnesota	49%
Pennsylvania	48%
New York	46%
Ohio	42%
Washington	42%
Iowa	42%



# Selected Findings: Health Insurance

- Highest % unauthorized *without* health insurance
